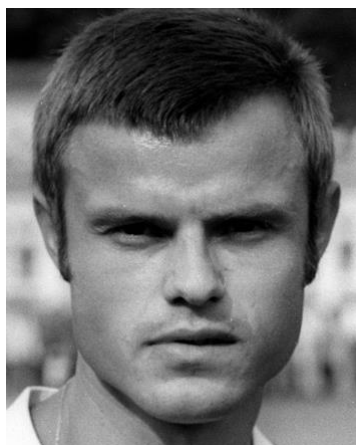

Assured on the ball, the left-footed Jürgen Bandura initially began his career as an outside left, then inside forward and finally settled as a left back. For many years he proved to be a key player for Hannover 96.

Began his career as a technically sound inside forward with the ability of a playmaker. In 1968 manager Horst Buhtz re-trained Reichert as an offensive left back. In this new role Reichert proved to be an outstanding player in the Regionalliga West for many years and he was still going strong when Wuppertal finally managed promotion to the Bundesliga in 1972.

In his first years as a senior player Jürgen Moll acted as a productive inside right or outside right before he switched to the left back position for good by the mid-1960s. Considered to be one of the best allrounders of the 1960s Bundesliga, Jürgen Moll remained a key player for Braunschweig until his untimely death in a car accident together with his wife in December 1968.

Mainly a marker, mostly used as a left back but also applicable as a stopper or defensive midfielder. The left-footed Ferschl didn't feel adequately recognized in Nürnberg and thus sought to change his club shirts. In Berlin he was part of one of the firmest defensive units of the Bundesliga until the 1971 Bundesliga scandal hit home and finished his professional career.

Fritz Popp was noted for his strong aerial presence and combative spirit. Similar in character to Berti Vogts, Popp was one of those players that were not blessed with an immense talent but had to work really hard to become what he became. Popp was an expert at neutralizing renowned technical dazzlers. Popp stated: "They are not only more sensitive than other players but with a certain experience you learn how they think and that they will try to show off their skill and once you get to that point you can kill them off quite easily. Moreover, they fear hard defenders, so you have the upper hand mentally." It is said that Schalke's Stan Libuda had to vomit every time before a game where he had to face Popp. Said Popp: "he and Jürgen Grabowski were my favorite opponents."

For 14 years the left back Franz Merkhoffer was one of the absolute key players for Eintracht Braunschweig and their rock-hard defense. A great personality, Merkhoffer set an example for consistency and endurance, was hardly ever injured and played consistently at an upper level. Merkhoffer was not a classic offensive full back. He convinced as a primarily defensive player: very assured in defense, robust and solid, good in distributing the ball from the back, adept at crossing the ball well from slightly inside positions, not a full back that was seen storming enthusiastically to the byline. Very calm player with a good overview of the game.

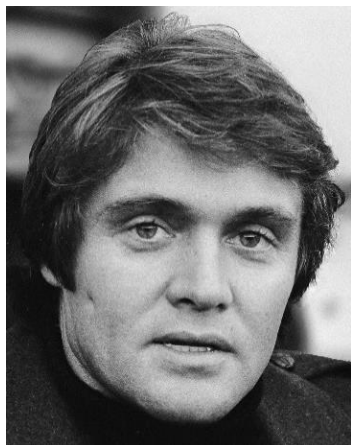

Udo Horsmann was the successor of Paul Breitner as Bayern's left back in 1975. A technically very sound offensive full back who was known for driving down the left wing, a great crosser of the ball with his left foot, strong and disciplined in defense, a good header of the ball, not much of a tackler. Was unlucky that during his time Bernard Dietz and then Hans-Peter Briegel occupied the left back position in the national team. Still, in hindsight it is hard to understand that a player of his quality did not collect a single cap during his career.

Given such qualities, it was only a matter of time for Kutterer to also have an impact in the national team. His debut in 1925 was so convincing that he would miss none of the next 6 games.

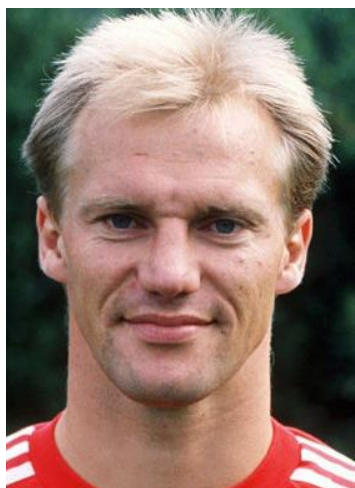

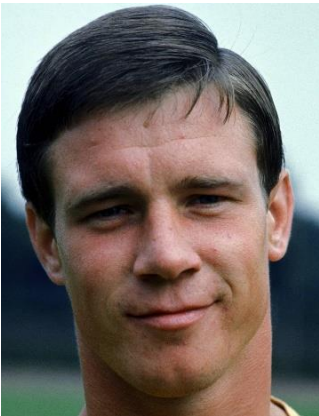

Nicknamed 'Rambo', the son of a Bavarian butcher had a reputation as a bone-breaking left back and man-marker, who thrived on the physical aspects of the game, while he was pretty good in defensive one-on-one situations, he had a penchant for committing fouls too often, not only as a last resort. Good aerial ability and decent in build up. Pflügler was very strong-willed and self-confident and was able to boost his team with his dynamic ways, a very powerful left foot coupled with solid crossing. Pflügler was the first active Bundesliga outfield player with an university graduate (as an engineer).

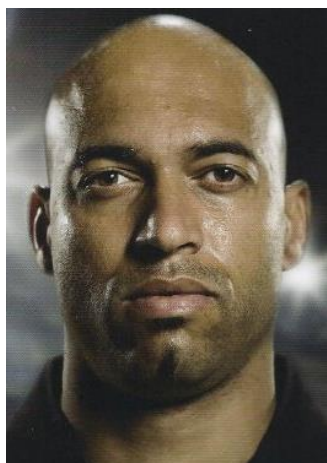
One of the first players in the Bundesliga that were reskilled from an outside forward to an attacking full back. Originally an outside left the young Willi Neuberger found it hard to come out on top against Lothar Emmerich or Sigfried Held when he joined Borussia Dortmund in 1966. When Neuberger retired from football in 1983 aged 37 he had become the Bundesliga's record holder with 520 Bundesliga games at that point. In the 17 years of his professional career he switched between various tactical positions spread all over the pitch. He is most well-remembered for his time playing for Eintracht Frankfurt from 1974 to 1983, where he was rated as one of the best liberos and attacking full backs of his day. As a player, the technically well-versed Neuberger was a rolemodel for commitment, stamina and consistency who would be hard to beat in one-on-one situations and who was known for his attacking drive from the back once in possession and due to his apprenticeship as a winger was a superb crosser of the ball. His versatility may have been the reason why he never was given a chance as an international during the 1970s: while he was good in many different roles, there was always enough better specialists around that stood in his way.

Suitable to play as either left back or left half, the tall Conny Heidkamp was known as a formidable sportsman of great fairness. He exuded a natural authority because of his sincere and straightforward character and always had a friendly ear for the worries of his teammates. His best game was arguably the 3-3 against England in Berlin in 1930. On the pitch Heidkamp was always immensely focused. He was known for his precise deep forward passes. Kicker wrote about Heidkamp in 1939: "With his peculiar footstep and the peculiar stand of his upper body one would notice him out of a hundred half backs. His long legs pulled the ball away from even the fastest opponent and with his short, precise forward passes he stimulated the attack."

Michael 'Ata' Lameck holds two records: he is the player with the most Bundesliga games who never once was capped (518 games) and also the player with the most Bundesliga games who never won a single trophy. Used predominantly as a left back he spent his entire topflight career at lowly VfL Bochum, a club always short of money and in the direct shadow of the big crowd-drawing neighborhood clubs Schalke 04 and Borussia Dortmund. Bochum managed to remain in topflight during all 16 seasons Lameck played at the club (1972 to 1988).

Lameck was an absolutely reliable player, who was good at all aspects that were demanded of a full back but not outstanding in any category. One always knew what could be expected of Lameck but also what should not be expected of him. Not a notable offensive capacity, he was tough in one-on-one situations with good passing skills, while he never scored many goals he did have a dangerous long range shot. His biggest asset however was his incredible consistency. In his first 15 years he played in 502 of 510 possible games, an unbelievable ratio. Plus, he was always a starter in these 502 games and only subbed out eight times. Only in his very last season, aged 37, did he lose his starting place in the first team.

Kremers was a member of the 1974 World Cup squad but didn't see action. He was also deployable as a defensive midfielder and as a libero (especially during the time when Klaus Fichtel was suspended due to his involvement in the Bundesliga scandal). Very unlike his brother Erwin, Helmut Kremers was not only sociable but also a bit of a rebel. Together with his brother he tried his luck as a pop singer in a duet which even reached no. 3 in the German language charts in 1974.

For close to 20 years the ruthless Billmann was one of the pillars of his club. Originally Billmann was signed to be the long-term replacement of centre-half Hans Kalb but he soon was partnering the ageing right back Luitpold Popp in defense and earned himself the reputation as one of the continent's most physically strong full backs with a special expertise at heading and tackling. His full back service started on the left side but he then moved to the right side to replace the retired Popp. As a right back however, he had no chance of getting past Paul Janes in the national team. His luck was that he was again reshuffled from right back to left back a few years later and now he partnered Janes in the national team.

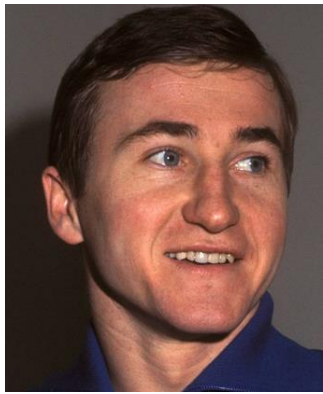

Of the "Heroes of Berne", Werner Kohlmeyer had the part of the "tragic hero". The left back was one of five players from Kaiserslautern that won the World Cup against the fancied Hungarians in Berne. Kohlmeyer impressed during that tournament with his combative spirit and enthusiasm. But after his career ended his life's journey became less sunny. A passionate gambler, he squandered two houses. In 1965 his wife filed for divorce, describing him as "phlegmatic and lazy, convenient and disinterested". Kohlmeyer suffered from being separated from his three children, began drinking and floated between joblessness and the life of a roustabout. Kohlmeyer himself said: "Maybe it would have been better if I had never played football." The footballer Kohlmeyer was an enthusiastic fighter, strong at heading and tackling.

Kohlmeyer was a defensive organiser with a good football intelligence but he was also known to be solitary and quaint. Apart from his footballing talents he was also active in track-and-field, notably as a long and high jumper. During the '54 World Cup he proved to be a valuable team player: in the quarterfinal against an utterly dominating Yugoslavia, Kohlmeyer made a last minute rescue and in the final against Hungary, while goofing before the second Hungarian goal, he kicked the ball off the goalline twice, furthermore he cleaned up several delicate situations and generally managed to contain the dangerous outside right Zoltan Czibor.

**Jakob (Jaki) STREITLE** (1916-1982)

Jaki Streitle joined Bayern München in the mid-1930s, which was a difficult time for the Munich club, due to its reputation as a "jewish" club which made life hard for the club while the "Third Reich" lasted. A technically very sound allround defensive player, Streitle was especially noted for his ruggedness and enormous fighting strength but at the same time was capable of artistical ball tricks. An expert at clearing defensive situations via forceful heading, his exact role is hard to define as he constantly acted in many different tactical roles. His most common tasks were that of stopper and either left or right back. Together with Andreas Kupfer, Streitle was the only national team player of Germany that played for the team before and after World War 2. A severe injury forced his retirement in 1953 but he was regularly re-activated to help out when injuries of regular players posed problems for the team. Without said injury, he might have made the squad for the 1954 World Cup despite his age of 37.

At the start of his time in Germany Bixente Lizarazu had to adjust to different tactical set-ups compared to his home country France. In France, he operated as a clear-cut left back in a 4-4-2, in Munich, he operated as a left wing back in a 3-5-2 system. His football upbringing could easily be noted when he started in Germany. While he played more advanced for Bayern, he immediately tended to drop back once his team was out of possession. His mindset was more that of a defender than of an adventurous quasi-winger. During his time in Germany, around the turn of the millennium, Lizarazu was basically without competition as a left-sided lateral defender. Not a man who sought the spectacular but instead he was looking to be as effective as possible. Lizarazu was a devoted fighter who went into one-on-one duels with wingers with fervor and ardour and as soon as he was in possession switched to the offense with aplomb. In these seconds after winning the ball, he sometimes was acting too hectic, losing overview and the ball.

At the start of his professional career in 1975 Briegel was a bit of a controversial player for football connoisseurs because he had excelled as a decathlete in his youth and thus was not deemed a proper football player. His physical appearance was clearly that of a decathlete and it didn't help matters that his moves were looking clumsy to some observers. His true love had always been football though and he had played the sport from his youngest days and didn't have to learn how to stop and pass a ball at the age of 17 as some ill-natured writers had claimed. Undeservedly, Briegel until this day has a bit of a stigma attached to him as he is used as the prime example for the end of the "golden age" of German football (the 1970s), where technique and ball trickery were allegedly the highest virtues, while with the start of the 1980s power, pace and stamina became the new virtues in German football, of which Briegel was the textbook example. What people forget is that football always had a mixture of all kind of different players and for a player of his size and upbringing, Briegel was actually quite a talented ball player, steadily working on his ball skills. By the early-1980s, he was an all-round complete athletic footballer with great physical presence coupled with sound technical passing and crossing skills in his left foot and a very good aerial ability. In his career Briegel started out as a left winger in his very early Bundesliga days but was subsequently withdrawn to midfield until he settled as a stopper by the late-1970s playing for Kaiserslautern. For Germany he was either deployed in a central defensive midfield position or as a wide midfielder and from 1981 onwards, after left back Bernard Dietz had been dropped by Germany manager Jupp Derwall after opposing the return of Paul Breitner to the national team, the left back position became his permanent place when playing for Germany.

### **Erich (Hammer) JUSKOWIAK** (1926-1983)

Today his name is almost exclusively associated with being the first German international ever to be sent-off (in the 1958 World Cup semi final vs. Sweden). However his career had a lot more to offer than this one sad incident. Described by Sepp Herberger as one of the greatest talents in Germany football after the war, he began his career as a forward but he soon settled as a left back with extraordinarily good positional sense and aerial ability and very good passing skills. He became famous in German football for his powerful shot which explains his nickname "Hammer". Juskowiak found it hard to cope mentally with being sent-off in a crucial World Cup game and many people made him personally responsible for Germany's defeat against hosts Sweden. When he was back playing domestically for Düsseldorf, he was often met with hostile reactions by opposition fans.

### **Bernard (Enatz) DIETZ** (b. 1948)

Bernard ‘Enatz’ Dietz started out as a left winger in 1970 playing for MSV Duisburg. In the summer of 1972 he was withdrawn to the left back position where he established himself as a very good attacking full back. A player with a pretty good technique, he was notable for his high work ethic and was unrelenting yet fair in one-on-one situations. In 17 years as a professional he was booked only 11 times and never sent-off. He is the defensive player with the highest amount of goals scored in Bundesliga history (76 goals). With his never say die mentality, dynamism, willingness to run and fight at all costs and self-sacrificial mentality he became one of the best left backs of the 1970s. He also managed to keep a high level of consistency between 1970 and 1985 when he almost never missed a game in all those years (played in 494 of 510 possible games). When Paul Breitner left for Spain after the 1974 World Cup Dietz became his successor in the left back position. He became captain of the German national team in 1978. In 1981 he expressed his dissent towards Jupp Derwall’s decision to bring Paul Breitner back to the national team. Derwall had decided to rely fully on Breitner and to build the team around his demands, something that Dietz was critical of. As a consequence, Derwall decided to drop Dietz, the captain of his team, and handed the captaincy to Karl-Heinz Rummenigge. An undeserving end to a great international career which had culminated in winning the European Championship in Italy just a year before. From 1982 onwards Bernard Dietz picked up the role of sweeper, as the full back position began to be too demanding for a player of 34 years at that time. As a sweeper for Schalke 04 he played until in 1987 and retired at the ripe age of 39 years.

Fast, tricky, agile, self-confident and tactically well-versed – the slender defender with the little boy face is one of the all-time best players in German football history. Good at crossing even with his weak left foot, Lahm arguably is one of the most complete full backs in football history. Lahm could read a game very well and as a full back knew when the right moment was to move more centrally, or to move more backwards or when the time was ripe to attack. A great full back usually is a quite complete player and Lahm was probably the closest to complete in the history of German full backs. Very cultured at short passing and a competent dribbler over short distances and not only a superb tackler, but probably the only German player whose tackling could be described as 'sophisticated'. Philipp Lahm is the only German that managed to reach a level of world class in threee distinctly different tactical roles: left back, right back and defensive midfielder.

Lahm felt immediately at home when Pep Guardiola moved him from the fringes of a lateral player to the centre of the game in midfield. There, Lahm shaped Bayern's game with breathtaking consistency. In some games during 2013-14, Lahm's interpretation of the defensive midfielder was close to perfection (against Manchester City at Maine Road, in Leverkusen and in Dortmund). He could rely on his lightning fast instincts and supreme football intelligence, knew how to switchover in a manner of seconds, extremely assured in his passing and general ball control, equipped with outstanding vision and a sense for the rhythm of the game. As a central defensive midfielder, Lahm was even more influential than as a full back. Joachim Löw was hesitant in the beginning to follow Guardiola's decision of giving Lahm a midfield role but soon he followed suit. That Lahm would switch back to a full back in the following years was mostly due to the lack of quality in that position, both at Bayern and the national team.

Thus Lahm's incarnation as a world class defensive midfielder was eventually just an episode in his illustrious career but it showed what a remarkable player Philipp Lahm was. As a right-footed player Lahm never loved playing as left back, as adjusting to the "wrong" side sometimes took him a few important seconds. Sprinting, stopping, cutting inside, crossing or shooting – it all takes longer when you're trying to use your stronger foot on the wrong side of the pitch. It also made Lahm calculable. The only positive was that he was more dangerous when he shot on goal with his right after cutting inside from the left side. An iconic Lahm move: seizing the ball at the touchline via anticipation, dynamic thrust forward, looking up, cutting inside, energetic shot – goal! It didn't happen regularly but often enough to become his signature move. It was the culmination of his offensive potential. Coupled with his defensive excellence, Lahm has become the posterboy of the offensively and defensively highly skilled full back.

Lahm was mostly playing as a left back during the 2000s, at the turn of the decade, Louis van Gaal finally moved him to the right back position, a role Lahm always clearly favored. Initially and surprisingly, Lahm did not do that well at the start as he had to re-adjust to his youth role after years of perfecting his skill as a right-footed left back. The full back role is possibly the most demanding job in football, it is a sign of a great player if he does great in this role consistently season by season. It is quite a sight seeing him address a pass over 40 metres pin-point and perfectly weighted onto the boot of a teammate. During the late-2000s, only Englishman Ashley Cole was a comparable full back. The greatest compliment was made by Pep Guardiola, who stated that Lahm is the most intelligent professional he ever worked with. And that Lahm is the first right back that dominated his team from that position. In doing that, said Guardiola, Lahm is on the same level as Bayern legends Franz Beckenbauer, Gerd Müller, Uli Hoeness and Karl-Heinz Rummenigge.

One of the best and most complete full backs in German football history, gifted with a very good technique and a hard and precise shot, as a youth he was a midfielder, as a young professional he quickly made a name as a full back that would play equally well on both sides of the pitch, due to his absolute two-footedness, albeit with a slight preference of the left foot. One thing he did not have though was pace. He loved to swing in crosses from an inside and outside position, although he could have been better at crossing at high pace, hence he preferred to cross an inactive ball. His left-foot had a more subtle touch while his right had more power. Additionally to his full back duties, throughout his career he frequently was used as a wide midfielder as well as a defensive midfielder.

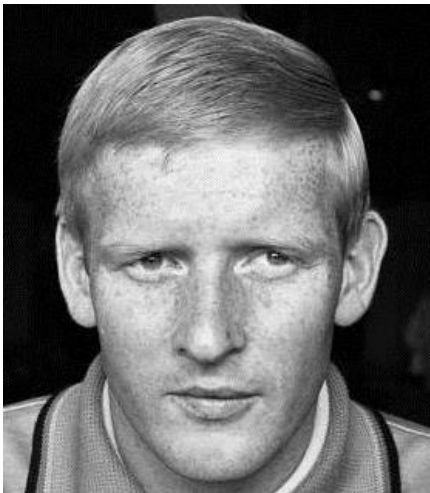
One of Germany's greatest ever players, he joined Bayern at the age of 18 in 1970 and quickly became a starter. In his first season, he was mostly used as a right back or as a midfield player. In 1971 he filled the spot left vacant by Bayern's Austrian left back Peter Pumm, who had returned to his home country. Breitner, who in his mind and mentality always saw himself as a midfielder, immediately impressed in this position as a relentlessly attacking full back that possessed every prerequisite needed for that demanding role. Very capable at buildup and passing, when in possession, he often acted as a fourth midfielder in Bayern's 4-3-3 of the early-70s, who often broke through on the left flank either on his own or in neat 1-2s played with his teammate Gerd Müller. Although right-footed, he was very competent at crossing the ball with his left foot, even in high tempo. For a player of his talent, he had an unusually high work ethic and had created his own fitness program which he imposed on himself already in his teen years and adhered to faithfully in his spare time over the course of his career. Breitner was arguably one of the fittest players of the 1970s. When he joined Real Madrid in 1974 he left his full back position for good and settled as a midfield player for the rest of his career.

Next to the classic playmaker Netzer, Breitner became a vital player who committed himself as a dynamic, hard-running “workhorse”, soon leaving the shadow of the ageing superstar Netzer. After three years in Madrid and one year in Braunschweig, Breitner returned to Bayern in 1978 where the successful team of the mid-1970s was slowly falling apart and which – after Beckenbauer had left the club – was desperately looking for a new leader on the pitch. In his last five years as a professional player, Breitner was at the peak of his powers, unanimously considered to be the Bundesliga’s best midfielder player of that era. After an inauspicious 1982 World Cup, in his last year Breitner was plagued by injuries and decided to retire at the age of only 31 in 1983.

The tall Schnellinger became one of the best German defenders renowned for his physical presence, pace and winning mentality, he impressed already at an early age, playing his first World Cup aged 19 in 1958. When he signed for Köln in 1959 coming from Düren 99, he was often playing as a half back but soon settled as a left back. In this position, he reached the absolute top level in international football the following years, impressing with his good overview, positioning, pace and aerial ability. Equipped with a very good touch, Schnellinger was adept at build up with his good passing skills but also an uncompromising tackler who was hard to beat in one-on-one situations. A hard-boiled nature, Schnellinger was hard to ruffle and with his stoic calmness he was very influential on his teammates.

By 1960, Schnellinger was rated as Germany's no. 1 full back and after his impressive display at the 1962 World Cup, where he easily was Germany's best-performing player, he was also considered one of the best full backs worldwide. Soon after the '62 World Cup, Schnellinger left Germany to play in Italy and he is now mostly associated with being the defensive pillar of the star-studded AC Milan side of the 1960s and early-1970s. In his first four years at Milan, Schnellinger was playing as a full back but by 1969 he was predominantly deployed as a defensive sweeper and formed a fine central defensive partnership with stopper Roberto Rosato. Schnellinger was intended to act as a left back for Germany in the 1970 World Cup but after standard sweeper Willi Schulz picked up an injury in the first game against Morocco, Schnellinger adopted the sweeper role and became one of the best sweepers of that tournament.
