Despite the fact that there was a waning interest as indicated by smaller attendances, the 1955-56 football season in Scotland was quite satisfactory—for the leading clubs anyway. The quality of the play generally still left room for considerable improvement. Here and there, however, the clubs have picked up some very promising young players from limited resources. They cannot mature too quickly. Scotland's prestige in the international field had a boost when their eye-opening display kept England in arrears until the last minute but bright hopes held out in that game faded a bit when the Austrians came to toy with a Scots team below, on that occasion, top club class.

Rangers were worthy League Champions, helped when Aberdeen and Hearts faltered, and there was general approval when Hearts won the Scottish Cup and Queens Park regained their place with the exalted. Floodlight League games were recorded for the first time with marked success and there should be more of them. They are among the desires of the fans. Apart from the gilt-edged attractions, they have no time for the ordinary friendly under the lights. Now to deal with the doings—and the prospects—of the various clubs.

ABERDEEN started the 1955-56 season winning the League Cup decisively, and opened their League Championship campaign fully promising to retain the title. They ran into trouble from the end of October to the middle of December, however, during which period without a win they took five points from eight games. There was a lively rally until April to bring them to the tail of the leaders, but vital points were lost "in the straight" and they had to be content as runners-up. Owing to recurring injury, Buckley couldn't give regular service, but his deputy Allan did not let the side down. With all their players full-timers, Aberdeen have the resources to continue to match themselves successfully with the best opposition. One of the few clubs generally providing polished football with a punch, AIRDRIEONIANS had a sort of see-saw season—up one Saturday and down the next, but they were seldom bothered with relegation worries. But when a club finishes nicely in the top half of the League table with 85 goals to their credit and 96 very much to their discredit, it's time to ask "Why?" They won the "B" League title, losing far too many goals, and their followers didn't relish a continuance of a leaking defence. It will require more than a new goalkeeper to repair what could have been much more serious damage, and if this is done effectively Airdrieonians can hold their heads high awaiting all comers. With perhaps the most loyal support of any club to enrich them in more ways than bulging their bank book, CELTIC, although reaching the final of the Scottish Cup, in a playing sense had a poor season. After a shaky start they looked like League Champions, but this promise did not last. Injuries weren't the sole cause of the slump. There must have been other reasons to find the directors facing angry demonstrators at the closing games and the fans coming in hundreds instead of thousands. No one could name a regular Celtic attack, and they won't find one until they can unearth a player or two with even half the constructive ability of a Jimmy McMenemy or an Alec Thomson. With all but one of the players who made them worthy holders of the Scottish Cup **CLYDE** opened the season visiting the newly-promoted Dunfermline Athletic. The crashed without recovery, and in the final reckoning it was the Fife club who beat them to retain First League status. Their League Cup experience was dismal and they played half a dozen League games without a win. But why say more after noting that they took only two points from home games, save a mention that they found a place in the semi-final of the Scottish Cup—more by luck than good guidance. Forward failing and simply "jitters" kept them down, and with the likelihood of having to build a new side it will not be easy for them to rise again. **DUNDEE** did not have a really bad season, but it could not truly be said to be a good one. There were flashes of a threat to the more powerful clubs, but the extremely dark days were from Christmas until the middle of March, during which eleven games brought them three points from drawn games. A fairly good finish put them in the safe places. Centre forward Merchant, with a meagre dozen goals, was their best scoring asset, and if he carries on again perhaps he can expect more valuable help for the clever young forwards manager Willie Thornton hopes to nurse to profitable maturity. Few thought that **DUNFERMLINE ATHLETIC** would be strong enough to face the obligations of First League football, and when manager Bobby Ancell went to Motherwell the pessimists were reinforced. But optimism reigned when they collected a dozen points from their first nine League games. Anxiety followed naturally from one win and three draws for 17 successive games. That brought them to the verge of relegation but paying little attention to what others were doing, they took nine points from their last six games with Clyde among their victims. At no time did they have great concern about retaining the company of Rangers and the other big shots. Their worst spell was in the first half of the season when a run of six games yielded only three points. They finished convincingly, their most notable performance being the 2-1 win at Rangers' expense, being Rangers' first defeat in 27 games. Apart from McCrae, a player with sound experience and a very valuable asset to a club building a side from talented youngsters, **FALKIRK** don't carry any players nearing the end of their tether. It may have been that they missed Morrison (with a long spell nursing injury)—a most effective inside forward at peak point, but the absence of one big prop does not wholly explain the waywardness of the "Bairns". From August to the end of the year they were well to the fore. After that, all they could do was to take eight points for eighteen games, and it was well for them that other clubs were in a bigger mess. Still the Falkirk future is not dismal. **HEARTS'** greatest joy was in winning the Scottish Cup, but they dearly would have liked to have completed the double by winning the League Championship, a feat well within their range not far short of the winning post. Maybe they have themselves to blame, but the fact is that in April they played six games and lost four of them. Rangers as champions finished seven points ahead! Hearts, in the midst of what the outsiders the greater triumph, will forget that miss and in the new season set about doing better. He made the best possible use of the players he inherited, and hurried on to rebuilding, introducing new players and switching others. To a great extent injuries were the cause of so much uninspiring play, but once they had their best men fit and a settled team, they turned the corner to carry almost everything before them, losing only one of their last thirteen games, seven of which were played in the closing month. It is to the credit of the "Jags" management that not one of their players was costly when recruited, and they will start the new season with all of them at command. ## The Scottish Cup Final

Saturday, April 21st, 1956, at Hampden Park, Glasgow.  
HEARTS 3 CELTIC 1

**I**N a period of 16 years from 1891, Hearts were in half a dozen Scottish Cup finals with four successes. In two of those finals they met Celtic, who won in 1901 and lost in 1907. That latter year marked Hearts last appearance as finalists before they battled through to meet Celtic again in this year's final. Many a time it was "Hearts year for the cup," and just as often they disappointed. All things considered they faced Celtic for the third time in the final rightly as favourites, and justified the confidence and hopes of their friends all over Scotland.

It was not a great game. The standard of play was below the level of some past finals, but sometimes it roused the respective camp followers to the highest pitch of excitement, particularly when the goals arrived. Without the goals the game would have been almost valueless.

The first came in twenty minutes, and the scorer, CRAWFORD, not so long ago discarded by Hibernians, the Hearts' great rivals, made a good job of it—a long shot beating the goalkeeper all the way. He had another three minutes after the interval to make Hearts less uncertain if no more effective. Confidence rocked again when HAUGHNEY, a regular right back, misplaced as a forward, was well up to score when Duff dropped the ball from a free kick and was not smart enough to recover.

Celtic, less polished than they used to be, but keenness itself, were in again with a chance. They couldn't take it. CONN scored ten minutes from time for Hearts to win worthily, and they took no risks before the final whistle. Hearts, excusably with so much at stake, were not at their best, but that best exceeded anything Celtic produced in the way of constructive football.

It was a great day for Edinburgh, and perhaps Hearts were so sure of themselves they re-entered the city, in all their glory, on the top of a double-decker which had its roof removed!
